

SUNLIT FORMS is but one more in a seemingly endless line of images taken in a north-facing room. The mid-morning sunlight through wooden blinds onto cushions, lounge and a small table. It never disappoints me. Always interests me.

A single image using an ND 64 filter to minimise the strong light / high contrasts and thus allow for

a slower shutter speed. Slight vertical movement to give the shapes a sense of depth and dimension. Processing with Lr to darken the surrounds - especially the blinds - to allow the subject to shine without distraction. CN17 Cinematic II filter for colour enhancement. Thanks to Debbie for the positive comments.

The theme for the night was "Creative" and as I'm not the creative type, I thought I would do something to challenge myself instead and have a bit of fun; as well as enjoy a mandarine.

I have tried several times before to capture something being dropped into water, but with no success at all. A major problem is finding a vessel with the walls clear enough, not to show up in the picture.

My solution for this one was to photograph it in the dark, with only one point of light coming down from the top. As I wasn't using a flash, it required a very high ISO as the lens I had was quite slow, f5.6. and a shallow depth of field was the result.

But the camera handled the high ISO and I was able to take a high speed burst at 1/500s.

My next challenge, is to learn to use the flash!

#### A WAY - Mark Foley




A stair case in the art galley, it stands neglected as the art and crafts are the champions in the shop.


The image was adjusted to black and white, and various crops were tried, finally I liked the tall image with two black areas.


