

The Crown Casino tower at Barangaroo, looking west. A striking design which, for better or for worse, dominates the skyline in that neck of the woods.


I chose to highlight only a section of the building, free of any distractions. The sky was quite beautiful at that time and made an ideal backdrop for something science-fictionally minimalist.

MEMBERS' CHOICE - MONO



San Quirico d'Orcia is a small village on a hilltop overlooking the Val d'Orcia in Tuscany, Italy. My wife and I were staying at a nearby village – Pienza – whilst holidaying and we drove there just before dawn on a crisp Autumn morning for a street walk and shoot. This particular spot is along the rampart surrounding the outer edge of San Quirico. That tower in the background overlooks the valley. We had just walked there after parking the car outside the village walls and this was literally the first thing I saw and shot on my first ever visit there. Being first thing in the morning, the light was perfect. More than that, the composition had the trifecta happening – direct light, indirect light, and reflected light. This meant that when setting my exposure, I could degrade the lit areas gradually so as to retain visual detail in the archway from the ceiling to the paving stones. Combined with the crispness, the fact of the time of the day meant I had no people or moving objects to contend with. Framing the image was, as you can see, not that hard, and

the lens I used – a Canon TS+E 24mm Tilt+Shift lens (the original 1989 version) – was the ideal focal length. Manual focus, as always, and the Tilt+Shift elements were not used.

The photograph was visualised and shot in black & white, the latter not being a choice but a fact, as the camera I used was my B&W Infrared-converted Canon EOS 5D Mark II. As the IR filter is rated to 830nm, that gorgeous light allowed me to capture more detail than would otherwise have been possible with a normal DSLR, or even a film camera. And being a deep B&W filter, it allowed me to achieve an even exposure through the sky's light down to the shadows. That light, on that morning, is rarely experienced but is my nirvana in terms of using the B&W IR 5D2.


Four years later we returned to San Quirico at the same time of day and with the same gear. Of course, I tried to replicate the earlier shot, but yeh, nah. The van was not there, nor was that light.

My settings were ISO 250, f8 at 1/80 second, handheld.

These are the high scoring images from the night, getting more than 13
















The Shutterbugs Go to Church
